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HIGHLIGHTS

Recovery: Pandemic dangers began to ease during the fiscal year, prompting positive changes in roles across county departments. Notably, Marin County Parks reopened outdoor opportunities. Residents responded enthusiastically, doubling volunteer rates and quintupling intern participation compared to the previous fiscal year when activities were shut down. The Department of Cultural Services welcomed back tour guides and ushers near the end of 2021–2022, restoring pre-pandemic volunteer head counts. Meanwhile, Health and Human Services (HHS) opportunities shifted. As Covid vaccination goals were met, HHS volunteers and nursing students remained involved, but in lower numbers. HHS volunteer senior peer counselors adjusted to client preferences; some met in person while others continued remotely, counseling clients by phone. This flexibility in scheduling occurred in several departments where roles that were remote during the shutdown remained remote to accommodate volunteer and intern preferences.

By the numbers: In fiscal year 2021–2022, some 7,283 volunteers and unpaid interns served 167,545 hours. This represents a robust rise over the previous year when the pandemic shutdown was in effect.

Intern involvement: During the fiscal year, the Marin County Fire Department initiated the Fire Foundry program, welcoming 8 students interested in fire and civic service careers. Meanwhile, the Registrar of Voters hosted a team of 26 in its Student Elections Ambassador program, and the Probation Department resumed in-person Career Explorers internships after two years of remote participation due to Covid.

With an emphasis on practical learning and diversity, Marinterns students received an inside look at careers in public health, law, communications, investigations, public safety, human resources, agriculture, engineering, public policy, information technology, and more.

Volunteer contributions: Responding to an idea from amateur radio operators, the Department of Public Works began the Radio Communications Volunteer program during the fiscal year. Its 26 volunteers stand ready to connect community-based organizations with information when regular communications are down during emergencies and disasters.

MarinShares volunteers with experience from many walks of life are active in nearly all 22 county departments. Examples of service locations include county offices across Marin, open space trails, Marin Center theaters, libraries, and Sheriff's Office facilities.

New staff: During 2021–2022, the County hired 15 student interns and 13 volunteers.

Staff liaisons: Volunteers and interns have county staff supervisors and mentors who provide connection and support. During the fiscal year, 130 members of the county staff worked with MarinShares and Marinterns participants across the county organization.

Recognition: The volunteer program has served as a model to other public agencies and garnered wide recognition, including the first National Association of Counties Acts of Caring Award and the California Department of Rehabilitation Excellence in Diversability Award for offering opportunities to volunteers and interns living with disabilities.

HISTORY

From then to now: Marin was among the first counties in the U.S. with a centralized volunteer program. The Board of Supervisors founded Civic Center Volunteers in 1979. Residents were invited to offer their highest skills, and the program immediately attracted participants. Our program—now named MarinShares: Marin County Volunteers—offers opportunities to those who wish to share their expertise, connects participants with their county government, and greatly enhances services to Marin residents.

Since the early years, internships have been part of the volunteer program. In 2020, the intern program gained its own identity and brand—Marinterns. The Marinterns program supports internships in which students learn while exploring public service careers.

The MarinShares and Marinterns programs welcome people of all ages and backgrounds.
