

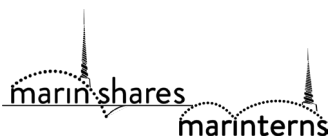

"I've always loved theater and was in a couple of plays in high school," says MarinShares volunteer **Jo-Ann Giunti**. "When I lived in San Francisco I ushered as a volunteer for both small and big theaters. As a San Francisco native, I would visit my aunt and uncle in San Anselmo. Even as a little kid, I always wanted to live there."

She moved to Marin County in 1972, settling in Corte Madera so her daughter could attend Redwood High School. During this time, she continued ushering in the city.

One day at the gym, she met a volunteer who ushered at the Marin Center and decided to do the same. She joined the team in 1998. Currently she ushers three to seven times a month, depending on the season.

From Office to Courtroom, Intern Experiences Legal Cases

An interest in public service led high schooler **Finlay Mallard** to intern with the Public Defender's Office three times a week since September. Finlay began the internship through the county's Career Explorer program, coordinated by Senior Program Coordinator **Luis Luciano** of the Probation Department. As a Career Explorer, Finlay is included in

Marinterns, the county's central program for student interns.

"I have always been interested in public service, law, and government," said Finlay. "Interning for the Public Defender's Office is an amazing opportunity to experience all the things I am passionate about."

Finlay's internship provides hands-on opportunities to learn what happens before, during, and after criminal court cases. He is involved in real cases, drafting questions, taking notes in court, participating in trial huddles, and assisting with administrative tasks.

His favorite assignment so far was with attorney **Aaron Pressman** of the

Public Defender's Office. Finlay learned to draft direct and cross-examination questions, and opening and closing statements. He also shadowed Aaron during a trial, a rare opportunity for a high school intern to study the work of a public defender.

"Finn is an exemplary intern who demonstrates not only extraordinary aptitude, inquisitiveness, and intellect but also an impressive temperament and emotional intelligence," said Deputy Public Defender **La Dell Dangerfield III**, Finlay's staff supervisor. "Within the first three days of his internship, I received a text from my colleague **Tamara York**, praising

Finn for the amazing contribution he made to our trial huddle meeting, where we explore themes for litigation using psychodrama and role-playing to uncover the layers of perspective in our cases. Finn displayed a facility rare even among trained lawyers. I anticipate that Finn will achieve whatever goal he sets for himself."

A junior at Tamalpais High School, Finlay is a member of the Mock Trial team and a student in the Street Law course taught by **Aaron Pribble**. He is a swim instructor on weekends.

Originally from Munich, Germany, Finlay moved to the U.S. near the end of elementary school and lives in Marin.

He enjoys soccer, cross-country running, surfing, and walking his dog, Murphy.

As an intern, Finlay is learning about public service, the civil rights work of the Public Defender's Office, and the importance of positive working relationships.

From the start, "It was very clear how much people cared for each other and wanted to give their clients the best possible representation," Finlay said. "The overall tendency for people to be good and want to help each other is very heartening."

He hopes to pursue a career in public service, either politically or as a professional in the judicial system. ■

Showcase Theater, and Jo-Ann volunteers for many of the Christmas performances. In summer, she serves at Marin County Fair events. In all seasons, her favorite role is taking tickets.

"I'm a people person," Jo-Ann says. Taking tickets allows her to greet patrons as they enter the Veterans Memorial Auditorium for performances. Among the many tasks that ushers perform, she finds that "it's much more fun to be on the front lines taking tickets or volunteering on Row 17, where I greet people and direct them to their seats."

After 24 years as an usher, Jo-Ann highly recommends the experience as a great way to make friends and have a good time while serving. She has recruited several others to the usher team and notes that the Department of Cultural Services is currently accepting volunteer usher applications. "Jo-Ann is a dedicated Marin Center volunteer," said **Gabriella Calicchio**, director of the Department of Cultural Services and Jo-Ann's staff supervisor.

"She is always ready to step up and usher for performances, festivals, and the Fair. She is friendly and welcoming to all. Volunteers like Jo-Ann are the heart and soul of our operations."

Covid brought in a new set of challenges, as some patrons refused to wear a mask. Luckily, Jo-Ann was well prepared. In her 35-year career at Southern Pacific Transportation Company, she spent 17 years as an officer at the railroad company and gained a lot of disciplinary experience. She could be tough but knew how to handle people. "You do have to make your people happy, and I think I did that."

Jo-Ann worked in several management positions in Southern Pacific's traffic department, managing people in various commodity groups, leading training, and more. Her last career position was as the publishing officer.

She had wanted to continue her education after graduating from Mission High but couldn't get the classes she wanted. So it was ironic when, years later, Golden Gate College offered her a job teaching railroad-related classes. She

turned them down, however; the night work would have been too demanding.

Jo-Ann moved to Novato in 1996. Her daughter and son-in-law live there now. Two grandchildren and one great-grandchild live in San Francisco. In addition to volunteering, she enjoys playing bridge and going to the gym for water aerobics and exercises. ■



Appreciation for Journalism Enhances Newsletter Writer's Role

MarinfoNOW writer **Marjorie 'Mar' Grannan's** journalism experience started with a bang. The first news story she ever wrote, while at Marin Community College, won fifth place in the State College Awards.

She was following family tradition. Her grandfather was on the San Francisco Examiner staff, and he freelanced for publications like the Saturday Evening Post. Her grandmother was a news photographer. And her sister worked at the College of Marin Times. "We'll create a position for you," her sister said. Mar ended up editing the entertainment and arts page, and her sister went on to become a San Francisco Chronicle copy editor.

Back in the 1970s after dropping out of college—"I wasn't taking enough units"—Mar applied for work at Macy's flagship store on Union Square in the city. She assisted in the photo studio, which shot all the Macy's ads.

Then large-size models began to gain attention. "I was large size, so they chose me as a professional model." She had the opportunity to work alongside, and learn from, top models such as **Barbara Minty**, **Patti Hansen** (**Keith Richards'** wife), **Apollonia van Ravenstein** and **Rosie Vela**. Eventually her agent switched her to regular modeling because, "I lost too much weight!" In the end, the money just wasn't enough, so she moved on.

Mar took an administrative job with the Northern California Newspaper Guild, which represented editorial and administrative staff of the Chronicle, Examiner, and more. "That kept me in touch with my roots in journalism." While working 14-hour days troubleshooting health and welfare benefits, she found time to assist **Merla Zellerbach** with her Chronicle column, "My Fair City." The column featured interviews with such luminaries as **Shirley Temple Black**, **Franklin Mieuli** (owner of the then-SF Warriors), and **Ray Taliaferro**.

The 1989 Loma Prieta earthquake proved devastating to Mar. The sight of the Marina on fire and the experience of driving coworkers home through a disaster zone affected her profoundly. Just crossing the Golden Gate Bridge triggered panic. So she quit the guild and found work in Marin as a senior receptionist at Industrial Light and Magic. Her team of six organized portable trailers and rented buildings.

After 20 years, she was furloughed during the pandemic. She stopped working full time to help care for her mother and stepfather, who had developed health issues.

To keep her writing skills sharp, Mar began volunteering with Community Action Marin, which helps clients with tax assistance, food, and legal support.

She contributed to their blog but had to adopt a tone different than her own. "I'm a pretty hardcore news and feature writer," she says.

Then in mid-2021

she discovered the County of Marin's MarinfoNOW newsletter, produced by and for MarinShares volunteers and Marinerns students. She serves remotely and has had an assignment nearly every month since. She interviews fellow county volunteers and writes—in her style—about their diverse roles.

MarinShares Coordinator **Anne Starr** of the Human Resources Department appreciates this excellent writer. "Mar's sincere interest in others allows her to learn what matters to interviewees," she said. "Her colorful stories often have a touch of humor and always reflect participants' strengths. She also has a gift for discerning the heart of a volunteer or intern role and explaining the impact on the county and our community. We look forward to reading her articles for years to come." ■
