#### **Discounted Fair Tickets!**

Current MarinShares volunteers and Marinterns students are eligible for a limited-time discount on Marin County Fair tickets, thanks to the Department of Cultural Services, which manages the Marin County Fair. The special price is \$15, with a limit of two tickets per County volunteer or intern.


The discount is good for fair dates June 30 through July 3. (Tuesday, July 4, is a blackout date.)

Discounted tickets are available in advance only, from May 15 to May 31.

To be eligible to purchase, MarinShares volunteers and Marinterns students must be registered and active as of Friday, May 5.

The MarinShares and Marinterns office will email a link and password—both necessary for purchasing discounted tickets—to all active volunteers and interns as soon as we receive them from the Department of Cultural Services. Watch your inbox!

Please note: On the first day of the fair, Friday, June 30, admission is free to children 12 and under, adults over 65, and military veterans.

## **Marintern Encourages Litter Containment** to Keep Bay Waters Clean

Terra Linda High School senior Livia Danku hopes to make waves in Marin's efforts to keep stormwater clean. This Marintern is focused on the Clean Marin program, a multiagency effort to keep litter out of the bay.

Livia serves with the Department of Public Works for the Marin Countywide Stormwater Pollution Prevention Program (MCSTOPPP). As part

of MCSTOPPP's partnership in Clean Marin, her primary focus is to further develop the Adopt-A-Spot and Clean Business programs.

Since starting the internship last September, she has utilized presentations, social media outreach, and contact with local schools, businesses, and community groups to make an impact.

A recent visit with third-graders at Mary Silveira Elementary School illustrates how Livia educates students

about the importance of litter-free stormwater. "I have done presentations and activities with the class to help educate them on properly sorting the litter

From participating in Marin County's Career Explorers program to interning with the Information Services and Technology Department (IST), Marintern Aliyah Bassa is shaping her career path with the County of Marin.

Aliyah was introduced to Career Explorers through the recommendations of mutual friends who had worked with the program, now in its eighth year. The program includes a comprehensive soft skills training course, a speaker series, and assignments in county departments.

"I thought it was a really good opportunity to branch out and get some experience in the workplace," said Aliyah.

"It was great. It taught me a lot of things, like the importance of building a LinkedIn page, networking, and résumé writing."

Aliyah has participated in Career Explorers for two years.

IST, where she has been interning since last summer. "Aliyah was a joy to have in the Career Explorer internship," said Luis. "I feel that she has really benefited from the real-world experience of interning."

Aliyah is assigned to the IST Digital Team, where much of her role consists of redesigning and improving the county's internal-facing websites, such as the Department of Finance site on the Hub (the county's intranet). The projects that Aliyah works on change week to week, and she spends time updating county Jotforms. (Jotform is an online application that allows users to create custom forms.) She interacts directly with employees in different departments, assisting with tech-related problems. Aliyah is also involved with the County Website Redesign Project Team.

Information Technology Manager **Jiku Park** is her staff supervisor at IST. "Aliyah's contributions have been notable," he said. "The IST Digital Team is looking forward to witnessing her learn more about digital products and services and to disseminate what she has learned to the community."

Aliyah's time with IST has helped her decide what kind of job she would want. She is majoring in computer science as a second-year student at College of Marin. In her spare time, she enjoys hanging out with friends, going to the gym, and reading self-improvement books.

"I had never had a tech internship before this one," Aliyah said. "It was really good, especially because I didn't know what to expect at first. I've been able to learn a lot so far, and it gives me a really good feeling for the career path that I want to take."

As an ambassador for the Marin Teen Girl Conference, Marintern Rory Daly helps empower her peers and makes a difference in her community.

Rory attended the conference

as an eighth grader and remembers being inspired to join from how transformative it was. "The first time I went, the conference was so great," says Rory. "It really made me feel like I was seen. When I was there, I knew then that I wanted to sign up and be a part of it again."

Rory signed up with the county's central Marinterns program, became a teen ambassador, and learned about planning and design for the annual conference held in March. Once a month, she attends meetings covering the logistics of the conference, including discussing methods of outreach and considering which community organizations and local businesses should be involved.

As ambassadors, Rory and her peers coordinate speakers, workshops, and available services in the community. They are supported by an adult team that handles necessary tasks and assists in setting up the conference.

After four years of dedication, Rory recently advanced to the role of Ambassador Lead, an assignment in which she helps to prepare future ambassadors and meeting agendas for upcoming conferences.

Rory's staff supervisor is **Crystal Martinez**, an aide to District 2 Supervisor **Katie Rice** and a member of the Marin Women's Commission, which sponsors the Teen Girl Conference.

"Rory did a great job communicating both with the ambassadors and the adult support team," said Crystal. "She brought a great can-do attitude to every meeting and became a more vocal leader as time went on. She has truly transformed from a shy ambassador to a skilled and thoughtful leader."

Rory attends Redwood High School, where she is a senior. In her free time, she enjoys playing guitar, dancing at a studio, and listening to rock, metal, and indie music.

Rory is undecided about college but wants to continue in a role related to advocacy. She hopes to pursue a career path similar to her teen conference role, inspiring girls in the same way she was.

"I would absolutely love to do this in the future," she said. "Everyone I work with cares so much about what we do and how we can take care of the community and make a difference."

It reminded me how much you don't know about someone until you get the chance to learn. Highlighting her role was inspiring and made me recognize how my peers are changing our community," reflected Calla.

The most rewarding part of her internship, in Calla's opinion, is showcasing everyone's talent in and commitment to their roles. "Everyone I've written a profile on has proved they dedicate so much time to making our community a better place, and I love being able to tell their stories. and waste they produce on campus," she said. "I then have them adopt their very own spot at the school that they can take care of and keep clean."

"I get to think creatively and learn new things. This internship has helped me become more educated on stormwater protection and litter around Marin," she said. "I truly have learned a lot while teaching students, working with social media content, and I have developed my communication skills a lot more."

Livia's staff supervisor, **Howard Bunce**, is a Department of Public Works engineering assistant. He works with the public outreach part of MCSTOPPP, providing information and resources via their website and public-focused programs.

"Livia has a very positive attitude. She's creative, self-motivated, enjoys working with kids, and has no fears about public speaking," Howard said. "With these skills she developed a great idea for a new program and is very enthusiastic about implementing it. Her Adopt-A-School Program has the potential

to grow into being the biggest part of Clean Marin's Adopt-A-Spot Program moving forward, and she is laying the groundwork for future interns to follow."
