

Regular readers of this newsletter will have seen several of **Doug Kaye**'s photos. Along with four MarinShares volunteer teammates, he is called upon to provide images to accompany articles such as this one.

For example, Doug has taken portraits of MarinShares volunteers Sheryl Hoy and Ray Peterson and Marintern Kate Lane, and photographed the Volunteer Team of the Year and a large group of Career Explorer program participants. He also volunteers as a backup photographer for the public information team in the County Administrator's Office.

Doug's interest in photography dates to his boyhood in San Francisco. His father had a wet darkroom, and they would visit what is now known as the Harvey Milk Photography Center. His undergraduate studies were in the drama department at UC Berkeley.

Although he did learn cinematography in graduate school at New York University, for 20 years his only forays into still photography involved family photos.

His early career involved theater, film, and TV in San Francisco and New York during the 1970s.

Doug transitioned from film and TV work into software, starting his own company in 1978. Then he, his wife (now married 52 years), and their son

High Schooler Lends a Hand with Homework and Library Help

Marintern Parinaz Sotoudeh found a community within the Novato branch of the Marin County Free Library last summer. She took on various tasks, learning to shelve books accurately and assist with library projects and programs. In the fall she joined the **Homework** Helpers tutoring team and now serves younger students.

A frequent visitor to the library growing up, Parinaz's familiarity and comfort with the Novato Library motivated her to get involved.

Her summer supervisor was Library Assistant Laura Beam. They formed a bond, and Parinaz recalls stopping by the library after her first day of school to tell Laura about her day. "I was super

excited to tell her about the first day of school and my schedule," she said.

Laura praised Parinaz and said her work ethic makes her a standout.

"She is very con-

scientious, asks great questions, and is eager to be helpful," Laura said. "I was impressed with not only her willingness to tackle difficult or more challenging tasks, but also that she specifically asked for them."

When summer arrives, local kids bask in their freedom and take more trips to the library to check out the numerous events and programs there, which results in more opportunities to assist. Parinaz's summer service was exemplary, said Novato Library Children's Services Supervisor **Laura Kennett**. "Parinaz was instrumental in keeping the children's area in tip-top shape," she said.

Parinaz, a San Marin High School junior, now serves as a Homework Helper at the Novato branch. It's the first time the branch has offered the free tutoring program, and Laura said Parinaz was instrumental in making it available in Novato.

(The student-founded program began at the Corte Madera Library in February 2022, expanded to the Fairfax and Civic Center branches during the 2022–23 school year, and added the Novato location in September.)

Parinaz assists students in grades 3 through 11 with their school assignments. As a tutor she caters to each

student's academic needs, whether one-time test prep or regular weekly homework sessions.

When not serving diligently in the library or doing her own homework, Parinaz has a wide array of interests including reading, drawing, and participating in her school's swim team.

She has big plans. "I want to study aerospace or chemical engineering in college and pursue that as a career," she said. One day, Parinaz also hopes to have a pet as she is a lover of animals of all kinds.

Parinaz appreciates the opportunity to assist the Novato Library's patrons. "I love the people and the librarians at the library and the people I work with," she said. "They're really sweet people and it feels nice to be able to help."

moved from New York to Marin, where he has lived in the same house since 1985. He sold his business in 1996 and then served as chief technology officer for four different dot-com startups, retiring in 2000. (His son now works as a light systems software engineer.)

It was for a safari in Kenya, in 2009, that Doug got his first digital camera. Although he takes headshots on occasion, his favorite portraits for *MarinfoNOW* are environmental photos. These involve capturing the volunteer or intern in a location representing their service, such as his photos of an intern at the Corte Madera Library and an Air Patrol volunteer pilot at Gnoss Field in Novato.

MarinShares Coordinator of Volunteers Anne Starr, Doug's staff liaison, points out that the Human Resources volunteer contributes to the newsletter in additional ways.

"Doug brings a keen eye for composition and portraiture that captures the essence of his subjects," she said. "We are doubly lucky to have him on the editorial team: he not only takes great photos but also applies some of his executive skills to help schedule assignments for fellow Marin Photography Club photographers who, like him, volunteer with *MarinfoNOW*."

Doug credits much of his success in photography to participating in the Marin Photography Club, of which he is a past co-president. Its 170 members join various special-interest groups,

such as travel, landscape, and macro photography. They enter competitions, organize field trips, and enjoy get-togethers. (Interested readers may learn about the club via its website or email.)

Parks Intern Expands Knowledge, Gains Practical Experience

Marintern **Gabriel Hartka** is a senior at Tamiscal High School in Larkspur with a passion for change and opportunities.

High school can become repetitive which is why Gabriel joined the Pathways Program. It provides an alternative educational route. "The Pathways Program offers a flexible schedule and is a great change from high school," Gabriel said. Pathways students attend their high school on a limited schedule and also take two College of Marin classes per semester. The program also requires an internship that involves six hours of attendance weekly.

Gabriel interns with Marin County Parks, and his staff supervisor is Volunteer Program Coordinator **Kirk Schroeder**.

Gabriel is learning to maintain trails and bike paths. He also is expanding his knowledge of plants—for example, helping restore willow trees at Stafford Lake Park in Novato—and has helped the Boy Scouts create a picnic area. (Gabriel was introduced to the work as a Cub Scout and Boy Scout.)

The Pathways Program allows Gabriel to be involved with his community

year-round. "It's just ... fulfilling," he said. "Even if it just seems like I'm moving dirt around, really I'm making space for mountain bikers to have races there and have their fun."

"Gabriel has helped strengthen our volunteer program by enabling us to take on an expanded portfolio of projects," Kirk said. "His approach to personal, academic, and future professional endeavors is impressive—he seems to be able to take on a wide array of interests with both passion and ease."

"I'm able to see these projects through," Gabriel said. "I get to see this bad overgrowth turn into a good natural place and habitat for some of the wildlife that lives here in Marin."

Another favorite aspect of his internship is interacting with Parks volunteers. He is "able to work with a generation of people I never would have worked with otherwise. I really enjoy the socializing and the conversations we get to have," he said.

Gabriel also enjoys knowing his internship will have a lasting effect. "It just feels like a direct connection to the community.

I'm able to inform people about the importance of their work and possibly encourage them to come back."

Besides serving with Marin County Parks, Gabriel is on a local mountain bike team and loves to surf. After high school, he hopes to major in business at the University of California, Berkeley.


